The park entrance sign is about 32 miles, or 50 minutes from the Court House in Clarion. We meet in the Blood Farm day use area parking lot on the right, less than a mile into the Park.





PA Migration Count (PAMC)

The 16th annual PA Migration Count (PAMC) will take place on SATURDAY, 12 MAY, 2007.

Participation lagged a little last year, though 900+ observers isn't bad. I'd love to break 1000 again, as we did a few years ago. If you've never participated, please consider it! A little more info, for those that might be new to this:

The PA Migration Count is a state-wide, 24-hour bird counting effort that has taken place since 1992. It's kind of like a huge Christmas Bird Count, but without the gloves and parkas (usually...). Results are tabulated by county; some counties have 50+ participants, others have none at all. Larger counties have county coordinators. Birders are free to wander an area, count every bird they see/hear, and send in the results. It's fun (unless you hate birds or fresh air or whatever...). Some people stick to their yard, some visit a favorite birding location. Others go nuts with a full day effort and huge species lists. Whatever your preferred style, the data we collect is always interesting.

New participants are needed! Combine your PAMC birding with the PA Breeding Bird Atlas – http://www.carnegiemnh.org/atlas/index.htm !!! Multi-tasking at its best!

2007 PA Winter Raptor Survey

The 2007 Pa. Winter Raptor Survey is complete, the 7th year in which wintering raptors have been counted using road-based routes.

This year, observers logged 505 hours, the second highest thus far. After building up during the first three years, coverage the last four years has leveled off at about 500 hours. The number of routes run was over 150, with reports from 61 counties.

Totals in 2007: Bald Eagle – 58, Harrier -107 (record high), Sharp-shinned – 43, Cooper's – 81, Goshawk – 3, Red-shoulder – 24, Red-tailed - 2218 (second highest count), Rough-legged – 87, Golden eagle – 3, Kestrel – 511 (record high), Merlin – 4, Peregrine – 7, Black Vulture – 542 (record high), Turkey Vulture –1260 (second highest count).

A more extensive report including county totals and maps of state-wide distribution will be published in Pennsylvania Birds.

The Mysterious John James Audubon

An extraordinary exhibition of the work of John James Audubon is now open at the Ned Smith Center for Nature and Art in Millersburg, in Dauphin County north of Harrisburg. The show, called "The Mysterious John James Audubon", will run through September 29. Curator Scott Weidensaul calls it "probably the most remarkable collection of original Audubon paintings, objects and prints that's ever been seen in the region".


Among the works on display are Audubon's original 1828 oil painting, "The Eagle and the Lamb", which at nearly eight feet wide dominates one whole wall of the Olewine Gallery. Also on display are all four original Double Elephant folios of "The Birds of America" (all of which will be opened to new pages each week), as well as a number of other original drawings and paintings by Audubon and his sons John Woodhouse and Victor Audubon.

There are more than two dozen hand-colored prints from "Birds" and from "The Viviparous Quadrupeds of North America", along with letters, a rare manuscript, print proofs notated in Audubon's hand, and even a life mask of his face made in 1839.

This will be the first time a previously unknown Audubon original has ever been shown to the public -- an 1812 painting of an American tree sparrow that the artist did in Kentucky, and which has been in a private collection since it first surfaced in the 1920s. No one, not even Audubon scholars, have had a chance to see this lovely work before now.

Many of these works are on loan from the John James Audubon Center at Mill Grove. (While Audubon is at the Ned Smith Center, an exhibit of Ned Smith originals from the center's collection will hang at Mill Grove.) The gallery is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. For more information, visit the center's website, www.nedsmithcenter.org.
